CONFIRMATION DATES SET - We intend to celebrate the Sacrament of Confirmation here at St. John's on Monday evening, September 28th at 7:00 PM, and again on Wednesday evening, September 30th at 7:00 PM. If your son or daughter is scheduled for Confirmation (having been postponed in the spring), expect to be hearing from us soon! Let's pray that a second wave of the virus does not delay us again!

SAINTS OF THE WEEK – On Tuesday of this week we honor St. John Vianney, the 19th century French Priest who is the patron of parish priests. His parish was in the village of Ars. On his journey to this obscure village, he stopped to ask a young boy for directions, saying "show me the way to Ars and I will show you the way to heaven!" Please pray for priestly vocations.

We also honor St. Dominic, noted founder of the Order of Preachers, an outstanding religious community of men and women committed to preaching the gospel and renewing the Church. I had the privilege of studying for my doctorate with the Dominicans at the Aquinas Institute in St. Louis.

"NO MORE WAR: WAR NEVER AGAIN!" When Saint Pope Paul VI addressed the United Nations in 1965, these words were his plea for peace. These words must be our words as well, as the world observes the 75th Anniversary of the attacks on Hiroshima and Nagasaki on August 6 and 9th, respectively. These bombs were the world's first deployed atomic bombs. The explosion in Hiroshima wiped out 90 percent of the city, with 50% of Nagasaki destroyed. The two bombings killed between 129,000 and 226,000 people, most of whom were civilians, and remain the only uses of nuclear weapons in armed conflict.

DAILY MEDITATIONS – My daily reflections on our website will continue to focus upon the life and spirituality of St. Ignatius of Loyola, founder of the Jesuits and renowned master of the spiritual life. Please join us!

FEAST OF THE TRANSFIGURATION - On Thursday, August 6, the universal church celebrates the feast of the Transfiguration. Accompanied by Peter, James and John, the Lord Jesus ascended Mount Tabor and was transfigured into glory in their site, both Moses and Elijah appeared with him. The voice from heaven is similar to the voice at Jesus' baptism — "this is my beloved Son, listen to him."



LONGING FOR SPIRITUAL WELL-BEING

The word of God serves up a tremendous feast for us today. Isaiah beckons all who hunger and thirst to come to the Lord for satisfaction. The psalmist cries out, "The hand of the Lord feeds us; he answers all our needs." Saint Paul tells us that nothing can separate us from the love of God. Finally, in the Gospel, we hear the story of the miraculous feeding of over five thousand people from a mere five loaves and two fish. Most of us have our material needs met on a day-to-day basis. These scriptures, nevertheless, have much to say to the contemporary believer. We must ask ourselves, "Where are my deepest hungers? Where are my thirsts?" After material needs are satisfied and, in some cases, over-satisfied, many people still experience a deep longing for spiritual balance and well-being. As the loaves and fish are multiplied in today's Gospel, perhaps our prayer can be a longing for the satisfaction of the deepest needs that only God can fill.

ADMITTING OUR HELPLESSNESS

Jesus' disciples, after a long day of preaching and healing, find themselves confronted with thousands of hungry people who need to be fed. They themselves were no doubt hungry and thirsty. In desperation, they turn to the Lord and ask him to tell the people to go to the towns and villages to buy food. Jesus tells them to give the people food themselves. They admit that they can come up with only five loaves and two fish, hardly enough to feed even themselves. It was only after the disciples admitted their total helplessness in the situation that the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fish occurred. Where is the lesson for us? It is in admitting our helplessness in life's most difficult moments that a miracle may perhaps be waiting for us.

MIRACLES OF MULTIPLICATION


Many believers admit that when faced with life-threatening illness, all that can be done in many instances is to throw one's hands up in total helplessness and, in desperation, call upon God. The miracle that can occur is often not a cure of the illness. The miracle may be the strength and courage given by God to move through the pain and grief with hearts of faith. Remember what Saint Paul tells us today. "For I am convinced that neither death, nor life ... nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord." When we know deep hunger for meaning and direction, when we are at our lowest, let us heed the words of the prophet Isaiah, and come to the Lord, that we may have life. If five loaves and


two fish can be multiplied miraculously to feed thousands, then surely the compassion and love of Christ Jesus can be multiplied again and again for those whose hearts hunger and thirst for healing and wholeness.

SEVEN SACRAMENTS

Matrimony (marriage) and holy orders are **sacraments of mission**.

They acknowledge and honor the ways in which we choose to serve our community and each other.

People celebrate these sacraments at different times during their lives. Which ones have you already celebrated? Ask the adults in your house to name the sacraments they have celebrated. On the lines on this page, name some of the people you know who will be celebrating these sacraments in the coming year. Is someone getting married? Do you know someone who will make their First Communion or be confirmed? Is someone ill who can be blessed and strengthened by the sacrament of anointing of the sick? Every week we all have the opportunity to celebrate the great gifts of reconciliation and Eucharist.

Memorial of the Passion of Saint John the Baptist

August 29, 2020

St. John the Baptist was truly the forerunner of the Messiah. Always one step ahead of Jesus' ministry. John was born first, began his ministry first, and died a martyr's death first. And it was clear that Jesus loved him, being deeply grieved when he heard the news of his beheading at the Read: Matthew 14:1-12 hand King Herod.

Jesus praised John the Baptist highly by saying, "Truly I tell you, among those born of women no one has arisen greater than John the Baptist."

One of the most highly venerated saints he has two feast days: his Nativity on June 24th and his *Passion* on August 29th.

Families and the Gospel

August 2, 2020: Eighteenth Sunday (MT 14:13-21)

The apostles were just being practical when they asked Jesus to "dismiss the crowds to go buy food." Jesus knew there is always enough when we place our trust in the Father, even with just (FIVE) 5 loaves and fishes. Trust is the bridge to miracles.

August 6, 2020: Transfiguration

At the Transfiguration the disciples saw a different side of Jesus. All of us have 'another side' which we reveal only to those we trust. A family is the sacred place where we can be transfigured to be our truest self.

August 9, 2020: Nineteenth Sunday (MT 14:22-33)

The demands of family can be so overwhelming we feel walking on water would be easier. When Jesus was pressured, He dismissed everyone, so he could be "by himself and pray." When overwhelmed and stressed, go to a quiet place and surrender your pressured feelings to the Lord using Peter's prayer in today's gospel: "Lord, save me."

August 15, 2020: The Assumption

"Blessed is the fruit of your womb" can be said of all mothers, because every child is "blessed" and a child of God upon whom God "looks with favor." This is our deepest identity and destiny. We do not earn this blessing. God's love is a free gift to each of us.

<u>August 16, 2020: Twentieth Sunday</u> (MT 15:21-28)

The mother in today's gospel persisted, even when she was ignored and insulted. She would do whatever was necessary to bring relief to her child. Parenting is more than bringing life into the world; it is also about sacrificing daily for your children.

August 23, 2020: Twenty-First Sunday (MT 16:13-20)

Like Jesus in today's gospel, we are seen by others in different ways. Perhaps the name our family gives us is closest to our true identity. They know us best. Who do they say you are?


August 30, 2020: Twenty-Second Sunday (MT 16:21-27)

Relationships live in a careful balance. If a person changes, the balance is altered requiring a shift in the relationship. In today's gospel Jesus announced a change and Peter resisted. Sometimes, those we count on for support may actually get in the way. Jesus told Peter: "You are an obstacle to me."

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


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
