#### A Few Words from the Pastor:

**REJOICE, REJOICE!** On one Sunday each Advent and Lent, the priest and deacon will come out of the sacristy wearing *rose* vestments and inevitably makes some sort of comment about how the color of his vestments should not be classified as "pink," but *rose*. Often the priest is somewhat embarrassed, wearing such a bold color! Yet, the use of **rose vestments** during the sacred liturgy of the third Sunday of Advent has been a part of the Church's tradition for many centuries. **Rose gives us joy and a promise of hope; our world is in need of both.** 

On both Sundays (*Gaudete* in Advent and *Laetare* in Lent), rose is worn to remind us that the season of preparation is coming to a close and the great feast is swiftly approaching.

Pope Francis has put a lot of emphasis on joy and even dedicated an entire encyclical to the "Joy of the Gospel." He writes in the opening paragraph,

The joy of the gospel fills the hearts and lives of all who encounter Jesus. Those who accept his offer of salvation are set free from sin, sorrow, inner emptiness and loneliness. With Christ joy is constantly born anew. In this Exhortation I wish to encourage the Christian faithful to embark upon a new chapter of evangelization marked by this joy, while pointing out new paths for the Church's journey in years to come.

**CONFESSIONS** - Because of the seriousness of the Covid virus, and the need to minimize gatherings, the Bishop has asked that we <u>not</u> celebrate parish communal penance services. He asks instead that we provide ample opportunity for parishioners to come for individual confession in the days leading up to Christmas. Thus, between now and Christmas, I will be available following each weekend Mass, along with a visiting priest to assist. This will be in addition to confessions before and after our Monday and Wednesday Evening Masses. Of course, you may always call me at the rectory for an individual confession.

**RESERVATIONS FOR CHRISTMAS MASSES** - To accommodate the large number of families who attend Mass on Christmas, we have added some additional Masses to our schedule. Masses on Christmas Eve will be at 2 PM and 4 PM, with the later Mass at 10 PM. On Christmas morning we will celebrate Mass at both 8 o'clock and 10 o'clock. Communion will be distributed in the front circle at 11:30. So that we are not overcrowded at any one Mass, we are going to ask that you make reservations. Please call the office (942-5503) at your earliest convenience to reserve your seat!!



## REPENTING AND REJOICING

The readings this week bear a certain similarity to those of last week—we hear a prophecy from Isaiah that is reiterated by John the Baptist in Mark's Gospel—but today the focus is different. Last week John told us to repent. Today he is the light leading us to God. Today is also known as "Gaudete (Rejoice) Sunday," as the reading from First Thessalonians commands us to "Rejoice in the Lord always." We are to rejoice. Right now. Combined with last Sunday, this seems like a mixed message. "Which is it? Repenting or Rejoicing?" But John is telling us that one leads to the other. As we prepare for the coming of our Savior we must first repent and then rejoice.

## A LITTLE GOOD NEWS

Many years ago, Canadian singer Ann Murray had a hit song that spoke of her frustrations as she listened to the radio and read the headlines. She sang that "we sure could use a little good news today." It strikes me that this is the message that the readings want us to leave with this week. The Gospel Antiphon proclaims, "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because God has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor" (from Isaiah 61:1 and Luke 4: 18). John the Baptist is here to testify to the light, to the Good News.

## WILL THE REAL MESSIAH PLEASE STAND UP?

The Jewish people were waiting for their messiah, they were waiting for a hero. They prodded John several times trying to figure out what his role actually was, and to see what he knew. It became a guessing game. He tried to say nothing, but finally answered in a humble fashion, "I am not he." He baptized with water as a means of leading people to the coming Christ and helping them to prepare. He somehow avoided the trappings of success that would turn his light on himself. Today he remains a road sign for us, pointing out Christ our Light.

We all want someone to rescue us, and most likely to fix the mistakes and errors that we continue to make as individuals and as nations. Much of that is human nature. Would there be as much fascination with superheroes if this were not the case? How many times do you as an adult turn to your folks for advice, or wish you could talk to a deceased parent? Some need help emotionally, others spiritually, others financially. The reality is that it is tough to get your "ducks in a row" and always has been. Today's encouraging message is for us to always look to the Light for our help. May


we always be like John the Baptist and testify how Jesus Christ, the Light of the World, has been our Savior.



#### The Church in the Media

These days, it sometimes seems as though any good news regarding the Catholic Church is overshadowed by headline stories that remind us of the painful past of child sexual abuse in our Church, and the way that leadership of the Church has at times ignored the issues facing them. The failure of someone in any leadership to act appropriately adds more harm to an already terrible situation where abuse has been historically present, and can re-victimize survivors who have already suffered so much. Whenever a new report of sexual abuse within the Church comes to light, whether current or past abuse, the Church's painful history with this issue is in the headlines again.

For those who strive to live the teachings of Jesus and work together for the protection of children, youth and the vulnerable, these stories about the harm caused by the people we love(d) and trust(ed) can seem overwhelming. Over the past twenty plus years, we have been confronted with the reality of these stories time and time again—in the media, and, from people we know. Our families, for example, might only focus on the failures of the Church—not on the accountability reforms or the measures that have been put in place to maintain safe environments for children. Our neighbors bring it up in conversation. Co-workers ask us about the issue. There is negative material all over social media. Op-ed pieces get written about the Church and letters to editors blame the issue of child sexual abuse on priests and Catholic Church leadership.

As stories continue to be released in news headlines, we might be asking ourselves when it will stop? When will we be able to say confidently that these problems are fully of the past, and that what we know about now is fully out in the open and being dealt with, correctly and transparently? All of this disclosure is powerful; it can be helpful to encourage other survivors to come forward and begin their healing journey, it can shed light on any holes in our behaviors or practices that need to be corrected, and it can give us the opportunity in conversations to share what has been done within the Church for accountability and child protection. Bringing the information to light, in a healthy way, is good, because it is honest and forthcoming about what was done and not done—what was condoned or overlooked or ignored. It is good for leadership to know how to lead more effectively, more pastorally, and more diligently—and to be held accountable for putting any personal feelings about any person ahead of the well-being of children and the vulnerable.

We can only truly be the Church Jesus founded when we are willing to share our pain and our triumphs, our shortcomings and our gifts, our regrets, and our joys. Remember, it is a good thing that these things are no longer hidden from view. Offenders can no longer hide their behavior behind a veil of secrecy or a charismatic personality. We, the Body of Christ, are calling out all that is sinful and hurtful and bringing light to the darkness.

Take heart! Consider that all issues come to light in this time because God saw that this faith community could be trusted to deal with the issue, bring it into the light, and hold accountable those who allowed abuse or other harm to occur. God trusts us, the Catholic faithful; to take care of those who were harmed by people they should have been able to trust. We can continue to be examples of how to create an environment that assures the safety of all, and we can listen to those who have victimized and help to bolster them in hope.

Whenever we are faced with another situation where someone did not act as a protector of children, we can take a moment to recommit ourselves to the importance of maintaining safe environments. Step five in the *Protecting God's Children Program*® involves communicating our concerns. If we ever become aware of a situation of abuse or the failure to report abuse, we must take action. Even if someone else says they will take action, we must remain vigilant. If no action is taken—we must keep reporting up the chain of command until our concerns are addressed. For instance, if you observe a concerning behavior (not actual abuse, or what causes you to suspect abuse; rather, inappropriate behavior that is unsafe, unhealthy or against the rules) by a parish employee and you tell a supervisor—yet the behavior continues—keep reporting! Report the instance to another supervisor, or the pastor of the parish. Then, if it is still ignored or you feel that resolution has not occurred, report it to the diocese.

As we continue to work toward preventing child sexual abuse from happening and stopping it from continuing, we are doing God's work on earth. We are creating an environment that promotes the furtherance of our faith, the expansion of the Kingdom of God, and the formation of people who serve children and youth with love, grace, dignity and respect.

As a caring adult, you make this happen! You are a protector of children, youth and the vulnerable and can help foster accountability and healing. YOU are making a difference that makes the difference!

A qualified charitable distribution (QCD) allows individuals 70 ½ or older to donate up to \$100,000 total to one or more charities directly from a taxable IRA instead of taking their required minimum distribution. As a result, donors may avoid being pushed into higher income tax brackets and prevent phase outs of other tax deductions, though there are some other limitations. QCDs are also called IRA charitable distributions or IRA charitable rollovers.

Contact your IRA administrator for the necessary paperwork and indicate the area you want to support. *Be sure to alert your parish or the Office of Stewardship and Development of your intention.* 

**Donation of Appreciated Stock or Mutual Funds!** If you have shares of stock or mutual funds that have grown in value over the years, or low basis stock, consider gifting the shares rather than giving cash. At the time of the donation, you get a tax deduction equal to the stock's fair market value and avoid paying the capital gains on the shares donated.
