

A Few Words from the Pastor:

VIRUS SAFETY - All are encouraged to continue wearing masks for the celebration of Mass. The virus still rages in our country. All are also encouraged to "sign in" as you come enter the church, which allows us to do contact tracing. This allows us to connect with those who have attended a Mass where an infected person has been present. We have had to do that once. And always, our church is sanitized after each Mass.

FRIDAY EVENING STATIONS - The Stations of the Cross or the Way of the Cross is also known as the Way of Sorrows or the *Via Crucis*. The stations grew out of imitations of Via Dolorosa in Jerusalem which is believed to be the actual path Jesus walked to Mount Calvary. We pray the stations to help us make a spiritual pilgrimage through contemplation of the Passion of Christ. Stations are scheduled at 7:00 PM weekly on the Fridays of Lent. Please join us.

FASTING AND ABSTINENCE - Put quite simply: Abstinence is "doing <u>without</u>" and Fasting is "doing <u>with less</u>." On the Fridays of Lent Catholics practice abstinence by "doing without" meat. On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, Catholics are to practice abstinence and fasting. Through the entire Lenten Season, Catholics are encouraged to undertake some sort of personal fasting or abstinence. Examples include giving up sweets, a favorite TV show or not listening to the radio in the car on the way to work. Giving up these things isn't some sort of endurance test, but these acts are done to draw the faithful closer to Christ. For example, a person may give up his favorite TV show, but if he simply turns the television to another channel, the Lenten penance really does not mean as much. Instead, the person should consider devoting the spare time to prayer or perhaps his family. How do you wish to fast or abstain this Lent?

MAKING THE MOST OF LENT - Consider now how you might make the most of this important liturgical season. Stations of the Cross, Daily Mass, use of the Rice Bowls, contribution to our monthly food collection – all these are valuable ways to celebrate the season of Lent!

THE QUESTIONS JESUS ASKS! - Throughout the season of Lent, my daily online reflection will consider the dozens of questions which Jesus asks his followers! In the gospels he addresses questions to individuals, to his apostles, and to the crowds. We read the gospels and consider that Jesus us asking each of those questions to you and to me, as individuals!

BIBLE STUDY ON WEDNESDAY EVENING - All are most welcome to join our evening zoom Bible study. Because of my teaching schedule at St. Vincent's, I have had to move this study to Wednesday evening. We will return to Tuesday in early May. Each week we take a careful look at the readings for the coming Sunday! If you would like to participate, please send us a copy of your email address so that you will get the link for the meeting! We would love to have you!

LENTEN FOOD COLLECTION - Our parish has been exceptionally generous with our Second Sunday food collection. For the Lenten season, let's make every Sunday a food collection Sunday, given the struggles which many families are facing in light of the pandemic and the economic downturn. Given the upcoming closing of the paper mill in Roaring Spring, we will explore ways that we might expand our reach to the 300 families affected by the expected layoffs.

CATECHESIS OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD - We had a very positive response regarding our plans to move ahead with this program of catechesis for our children. We will begin with a focus on children ages 3 to 6. Consulting with us in this endeavor is Gaye Boyer, who for many years has been directing this program at St. Aloysius in Cresson. Gaye will be coming to our Parish Council meeting in March. If you have an interest in learning more as a parent or perhaps a teacher, please contact the parish office. There will be training for the Catechists this summer at St. Thomas More parish in Indiana!

CONFIRMATION THIS SPRING - Because of concerns regarding Covid-19, the bishop has instructed pastors to again schedule Confirmation in their own parish. We have set the date for Wednesday, April 14th, at 7:00 PM. While we might miss the solemnity of having Confirmation in the Cathedral, there is a beautiful simplicity in celebrating in our home parish.

THE YEAR OF SAINT JOSEPH - To celebrate the 150th anniversary of Blessed Pope Pius IX's declaration of St Joseph as Patron of the Universal Church, Pope Francis has proclaimed a special "Year of St Joseph," beginning on the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception 2020 and extending to the same feast in 2021. St. Joseph, pray for us! A banner is displayed in our church, reminding us of his place in our lives as patron of the Church.





BAPTISM

Today's readings suggest two different meanings and experiences of baptism. The second reading (from 1 Peter) makes an analogy between Noah's ark and Christian baptism: just as Noah and his family were saved from death by going through the waters of the flood in the ark, Christians are saved from sin and death by going through the waters of baptism. The first reading, from Genesis, portrays the world after the flood: washed clean of its prior wickedness, embraced by God's promises that the world will never again be destroyed by water. The psalmist expresses a desire to follow the ways of God, as if re-establishing the harmony between God and humanity destroyed by sin. This peaceful scene is very different from the drama and urgency in Mark's description of Jesus after his baptism. Jesus battles demons, receives sustenance from angels, and begins preaching: "Repent. The kingdom of God is at hand."

GOOD MORNING! WELCOME TO LENT!

You probably did not get that greeting from your priest today, and you probably did not expect it. Isn't Lent a time of reflection and repentance? Somber purple, no "Alleluias"? Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving; attending to one's relationship with God?

True enough; however, there are Lenten practices that have a festive air woven into these penitential elements. One example is in the Church's retrieval of ancient Lenten practices that made up the final preparation of persons elected to receive the Easter sacraments of baptism, confirmation, and eucharist. Jesus' urgent preaching in today's passage from Mark comes soon after his own baptism and reminds us that these sacraments still signal a dramatic change in a person's life: they have responded to Jesus' preaching of the kingdom and are now publicly professing themselves to be disciples of the Lord and fully initiated members of his visible church. The prayer, fasting, and almsgiving during Lent were part of that preparation. Repentance was then, and remains today, important also for those already fully initiated; the work of repentance, of prayerfully examining our lives and making changes in anticipation of God's reign, is an ongoing aspect of our life in Christ.

A SECOND CHANCE TO MAKE A FIRST IMPRESSION


Other changes with baptism are more subtle and personal. When Noah and his family emerged from the ark, they saw that the floodwaters had receded after cleansing the world of human sinfulness. Everything was clean and fresh—a new creation, with a rainbow to guarantee God's promise to never again destroy the world with water. So, too, will the newly baptized emerge from the font and be anointed with chrism. Like

the earth after the great flood, they are a new creation. Washed clean of sin and anointed with chrism, they are renewed in the embrace of the God of covenant love.

This is why Lent is always a festive anticipation of Easter and always about baptism, just as it is always about the repentance that draws us more deeply into God's kingdom.

PLENARY INDULGENCE FOR THE YEAR OF SAINT JOSEPH

The decree of the Apostolic Penitentiary made on December 8, 2020, announcing the decision of Pope Francis to celebrate this special Year of Saint Joseph in honor of the Guardian of the Redeemer through December 21, 2021 stated:

"the faithful will have the opportunity to commit themselves "with prayer and good works, to obtain, with the help of St. Joseph, head of the Heavenly Family of Nazareth, comfort and relief from the serious human and social tribulations that besiege the contemporary world today." (*Church Grants Plenary Indulgence for the Year of St. Joseph*, Adapted from the Vatican News article, December 8, 2020, Vatican City.)

THEOLOGY OF INDULGENCE

A traditional aspect of any Jubilee Year is the granting of the Jubilee indulgence. Although, not a Jubilee Year, the Special Year of Saint Joseph has been decreed as a special year in which the faithful can be granted a Plenary Indulgence. By definition, an indulgence is linked to jubilee themes of release, reconciliation and forgiveness of sins.

The very first Holy Year in 1300 possessed a serious penitential character where the faithful made pilgrimage and made a full confession of sins. The jubilee year indulgence was understood by Christians as the Old Testament Jewish traditions of the themes of release, forgiveness, and reconciliation. They were focused on the great redemption won by Christ and now available to all for the remission of sins. Over the centuries the great indulgence of the jubilee year developed and included pilgrimage, penance, confession of sins, and receiving Communion.

This pardon of sin, first of all, comes through the Church as a gift from God, through the power to forgive sins granted by Jesus Himself (Matthew 16:19; 18:18; John 20:22-23). This sacramental power of forgiveness of sins is present in the Church through the power of the Holy Spirit and a gift of God for release, forgiveness, and healing.

Once sin has been forgiven or pardoned, there is still a rupture or a disorderedness in the human person's relationship with God. A deep interior renewal of the person is still needed. This deep journey of conversion is a process that continues throughout the Christian life; recognition of sin, contrition, repentance, forgiveness, and ongoing personal renewal and healing. An indulgence is meant to re-order one's relationship with God and also to repair the defects of the disorder. ("Indulgences and the Jubilee Year 2000" - Aurelie A. Hagstrom, NCCB Subcommittee) An indulgence is partial or plenary according as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due to sin. Indulgences may be applied to the living and the dead. [Catechism of the Catholic Church, Number 1471. (Pope Paul VI, Apostolic Constitution, "Indulgentiarum Doctrina."]

Conditions for the Plenary Indulgence for the Year of Saint Joseph

The usual conditions to receive a plenary indulgence:

- 1. Celebrate Sacramental Confession (going to Confession within 20 days *before* or within 20 days *after* the indulgence is sought). A person should be of the spirit that is sincerely and willfully detached from any sin, mortal and venial. 2. Receive Holy Communion while participating fully, actively, and consciously at Mass.
- 3. Pray for Pope's needs and intentions: The Creed, Our Father, Hail Mary, and Glory Be.

Due to the ongoing coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the Holy See made provision that persons who are currently unable to go to Mass or confession because of public health restrictions may defer reception of those two sacraments until they are able to do so. Those who are sick, suffering, or homebound may also receive the plenary indulgence as much as they are able and by offering their sorrows and sufferings to God through Saint Joseph, consoler of the sick and patron saint for receiving a good death.

Special opportunities indicated by the Apostolic Penitentiary for the Plenary Indulgence:


- Meditate for at least 30 minutes on the Lord's Prayer or participate in a spiritual retreat of at least one day that includes a meditation on Saint Joseph
- ❖ Perform a corporal or spiritual work of mercy, inspired by the life and example of Saint Joseph
- Pray the rosary together as a family, or an engaged or married couple, modeling the virtues of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph
- Dedicate with confidence their daily work to the protection of Saint Joseph the Worker, including the efforts of those who are unemployed, underemployed, or seeking more dignified work
- ❖ Devoutly recite the Litany of Saint Joseph or another suitable prayer in each liturgical tradition (Akathistos to St. Joseph, Byzantine), especially for the intentions of persecuted Catholics in the Church and around the world, and for all the relief of all Christians who suffer persecution in the world
- Devoutly recite another approved prayer to Saint Joseph on various feasts of Saint Joseph: March 19 (his solemnity), May 1 (St. Joseph the Worker), or St. Joseph Sunday (according to the Byzantine tradition), or on the 19th day of each month, or each Wednesday, traditionally dedicated to honor his memory with pious devotions

Making a pilgrimage to a local designated site to satisfy the normal conditions is encouraged.

The local designated pilgrimage sites in the Diocese of Altoona-Johnstown will be:

Saint Joseph Church, Bellwood Saint Joseph Church, Renovo Saint Joseph the Worker Church, Williamsburg Saint Joseph Mission Church at Hart's Sleeping Place, Carrolltown

Schedules for prayer at the Churches as well as additional prayer opportunities will be published by the Solemnity of Saint Joseph, Spouse of the Blessed Virgin Mary, March 19, 2021.






THOSE WHO KEEP YOUR CONVENANT

At every Sunday liturgy, throughout the year as well as during Lent, we hear four passages from scripture. We sit and listen to the first reading from the Old Testament and the second reading, usually from one of the Letters. We stand to hear the reading from the Gospel. Between the first and second readings we pray one of the psalms. We usually sing the psalm but sometime we recite it. The beautiful words of the psalms remind us of God's love. This week's psalm response is:

Your ways, O Lord, are love and truth to those who keep your covenant. (Psalm 25:10)

A covenant is an agreement between two parties. Both parties promise to do certain things in order to keep the agreement. The covenant mentioned in this psalm is between God and God's people. You are one of the people of this covenant. The prophet Jeremiah said that God would write the covenant upon our hearts so that we will never forget it (Jeremiah 31:33).

On one side of this heart, think of what God has promised us. On the other side, think of ways that we can keep our part of the covenant. How can we be God's people? These examples will help you get started.



If you sing the psalm at Mass today, listen carefully to the melody of the response.

Try to remember it and sing it during the week.

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
