The family went to Jerusalem for the feast of Passover. On their return Jesus became separated from his parents. They first thought he was in the caravan with others. They searched for three days. When they found him, he was discussing matters of his faith with the teachers in the synagogue. Joseph and Mary expressed their concern and worry. He told them that he must be about his Father's work.

"Tenderness is the best way to touch the frailty within us. Pointing fingers and judging others are frequently signs of an inability to accept our own weaknesses. Only tender love will save us from the snares of the accuser. That is why it is so important to encounter God's mercy especially in the Sacrament of Reconciliation, where we experience his truth and tenderness. We know that God's truth does not condemn, but instead welcomes, embraces, sustains and forgives us. Pope Francis compared that truth always to the merciful father in the parable Jesus told of the Lost Son. Truth comes out to meet us, restores our dignity, sets us back on our feet and rejoices for us."

ST. JOHN THE EVANGELIST PARISH HISTORY 101 - CHAPTER 3

In chapters 1 & 2, we outlined our parish's formation in 1920 & growth through 1990. This week we begin in 1991, the year our dream of a new worship space really began.

- 1991 In November, the parish received a large bequest from General Wilfred A. & Mrs. Louise Adler Morgan. A long range planning committee was formed to consider the best use for these funds.
- 1991 In December, the committee reported its findings, which included these 3 main needs/recommendations: a larger worship space, space for a kindergarten & possibly a pre-kindergarten, & additional space for educational & social functions. The next month, the parish council accepted the above recommendations.
- 1992 On May 11th, the parish council recommended a new building for worship with plans to reclaim the present worship space for educational space.
- 1992 In August, permission was received from Bishop Adamec to compile a cost estimate.
- 1992 In August & November, properties at 346 & 344 Baynton Avenue were purchased.
- 1993 In January, Hayes, Large Architects & Ed Kale, Liturgical Consultant were hired. (Four architectural firms had been interviewed the previous month.)
- 1993 Between March & July, 4 educational meetings were held for the parish to discuss liturgical & parish requirements for a new church & also to gather input from parishioners on design ideas for the new building.
- 1993 In April, a building committee was formed.
- 1993 Between August 1993 & September 1994, 3 additional surrounding properties were purchased.
- In November, a capital campaign to help fund the building project was begun. A minimum goal of \$750,000 was established & by December 11th, the pledges received from parishioners totaled \$634,350.
- 1994 On December 22nd, representatives from parish council & from the finance, building, & capital campaign committees unanimously voted to proceed with the building of a new worship space although only \$705,000 of the \$750,000 goal had been pledged.
- 1996 On Palm Sunday, March 28th, ground breaking ceremonies were held.
- 1996 On Christmas Eve, Masses were held for the first time in our new worship space.
- 1997 On February 2nd, our new church was dedicated by Bishop Adamec & a reception for all parishioners followed.

GOD FEEDS AND CARES FOR US

Today's message could be summed up in psalm 145, "The hand of the Lord feeds us, he answers all our needs." Each reading shows how carefully God feeds and cares for us, in an up-close and personal fashion. Elisha fed the crowd from twenty barley loaves. Jesus blessed a few loaves and thousands were fed. Perhaps this seems far-fetched, but we read stories in the news about chefs taking the leftovers from fancy restaurants and feeding many people in a soup kitchen. As a schoolgirl, one of my favorite stories was "Stone Soup," the tale of a couple of war-weary soldiers convincing the people of a frightened and starving little country village to bring out their meager supplies and share them to make a marvelous soup to feed the town. The second reading asks us to "Consider well our call." How do we respond to those in need around us?

MIRACLE OR MAGIC?

It can be easy to just say, "Oh yes, this is the story of the miracle of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes, when everybody decided to share the bits of food they had." But how much of it is really about feeding the crowds? "Jesus said to Philip, 'Where can we buy enough food for them to eat?' He said this to test him, because he knew what he was going to do." It must have been very hard to trust Jesus, especially when the disciples often didn't understand him. This year has been challenging for us, too, to trust that God will provide, and also challenging for us to ask for help.

In the Rule of Saint Benedict, there is a chapter called "The assignment of impossible tasks." It says, in essence, that when your superior tells you to do something impossible, it is fine to go talk to them about it, but in the end you may still be asked to do this task. In what situations are we called to trust? When are we asked to act in faith or to do the impossible task?

HOW WILL WE KNOW WE ARE DOING THE RIGHT THING?

Miracles are seldom as obvious as the multiplication of loaves and fishes. Many years ago, I overheard a family conversation in a restaurant at the end of a long holiday weekend. At the register was one of those collection jars saying, "For just fifty cents a day you can feed a child." The little girl asked her folks about it and they explained it. She said, "I have money left from my weekend, could I put it in the jar?" The parents said yes and let her go on the adventure for herself. She came back and sat down, and they chatted some more. She said, "If fifty cents feeds a child for a day, then I


was able to feed one for three days, because I had \$1.50 left from the weekend." When we follow this child's example and go beyond the minimum, when we give all we can, we know we are doing the right thing, and we have understood the test that Jesus posed to Philip so long ago.




MANY GRAINS, ONE LOAF

Over the next few weeks the Gospels will contain stories about bread.

Today we hear about Jesus feeding a large crowd with a few loaves of bread and some fish.


In later weeks, Jesus calls himself our "living bread."

Did you ever wonder why Jesus used bread as the sign to remind us of his presence among us? Think about how bread is made. Most of our bread is made from wheat. When the wheat is ripe it is gathered and the grains ground into flour. The flour is then mixed with other ingredients and baked in an oven. Only then can the loaf of bread be shared and eaten. The many individual grains of wheat become one loaf of bread that we share.




The bread we share at Eucharist might look like one of these pictures.

Each time we receive Jesus in the form of bread, we say we believe that we are united with all those around the world who also receive Jesus.
